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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

The Government New Law College, Indore (M.P) has been integral part of Holkar Science College which was established 125 years ago in 1891. It was in the year 1923, the legal education started in the Holkar College. In the year 1961, Arts, Commerce and Law branch were separated from the Holkar College and a new college was established as Government Arts Commerce and Law college, Indore. The foundation stone of the college building was kept by the world famous prime minister late Shree Jawaharlal Nehru on November 3, 1958 and further which was inaugurated by world famous philosopher and president late Dr. Radhakrishnan on December 27, 1960.

The college started its new session in the year 1961. As per the directives of the Bar Council of India, Govt. of Madhya Pradesh established separate law college on 17.07.2003, Since then this new law college came into existence.

This Institution has contributed immensely in the field of law and has groomed its students such that they don't only achieve heights in studies, but also prove them as successful lawyers, teachers and law service providers. The students of this college have been honored as the state minister, high court judges and supreme court judges too. For overall growth of the students, the college provides them with the special facilities of legal aid camp, counselling, moot court and drafting and also organizing various competitions like legal quiz and debate. To develop interest in academic activities law Council is also constituted. Law college organizes lectures of national level thinkers and jurists. Guest lectures are also being organized on time to time by inviting judges of the high court, senior advocates and professors. Overall academically sound, this historical law college is now developing in a new dimension.

Teaching faculty of the college is efficient and studious and working with zeal for brightening the academic career of the students. Library is the soul of the college having 14535 books along with periodicals, journals and magazines. The college has a spacious ground for the games and sport activities as well as spacious auditorium for the cultural and educational activities.

- Low number of placements due to lack of aided professional courses.
- Old building needs supplementation though new buildings are under constriction.
- Requirement of new regular Teachers for the implementation of new trend in law.
- As it is a government college procedure technicalities some times, comes in the way of it's functioning

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Being the affiliated PG College, we offer Under Graduate, Post Graduate, Career orientated certificate courses and Ph.D. in Law to keep the students updated. The syllabi of the courses are designed by D.A.V.V University, Indore (M.P) . The teachers ensure effective curriculum delivery by preparing a proper teaching plan, academic calendar unit tests, tours, court visits, guest lectures, and the use of ICT. They are supported by the institute with initiatives like “Principal Address” an orientation program for first year students, Merit Mission for advanced learners and Remedial Coaching for slow learners, Teacher Student mentor Scheme and feedback from students and other stakeholders. All the above courses aim to address cross cutting issues relevant to Gender, Environment and Sustainability, Human Values and Professional Ethics apart from imparting subject knowledge. Feedback from students, teachers, alumni, and parents on various aspects of the curriculum and teaching is taken regularly. The College offers the Electives programme in Under Graduate and Post Graduate. In the last five years, we have introduced BB.A.LL.B, certificate courses in ADR and Ph.D. center as per new norm. During the last five years, some teachers worked as Members and Chairpersons of the Boards of Studies and other Academic Bodies of the University. Some teachers are working as executive member of subject teachers of bond of studies and faculty the university which are working for the improvement in curricula. Structured feedback on curriculum from different stakeholders is collected, analyzed and action taken .Report is available on college website.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

"The increase in student enrollment reflects the college's academic success and growth." The college has facilitated learning through specific programmes designed especially for slow and advanced learners that have had positive results. The focus is on student-centered teaching strategies including field trips, educational tours, industrial visits, court visits, jail visit projects, etc. to enhance the educational experience. To improve the effectiveness and creativity of the teaching and learning process, ICT inclusion is desired. For the past five years, there has been a steady increase in teachers' usage of ICT for the teaching and learning process. The achievement of programme outcomes has been facilitated through the encouragement of innovation and creativity in teaching and learning. To meet the mentee's academic needs, the college has proposed a self-evolved mentor-mentee programme. In order to build a clear and reliable internal examination system that adheres strictly to the carefully thought-out academic calendar, changes are being made to the frequency and diversity of internal examinations.

For the past few years, the IQAC has developed and implemented an evaluation method for the achievement of programme outcomes to determine the caliber of teaching and learning processes. The average result percentage is steadily increasing.

Research, Innovations and Extension

In the areas of extension, consulting, and research, we have made significant progress. Recognized Ph.D. supervisors include four faculty members. Under the guidance of college research supervisors, 8 research scholars have been granted Ph.D. degrees. Out of 30 faculties, 7 professors have earned their doctorates, and 4 professors have submitted their thesis. The university has acknowledged the study of law as a research centre. The college's faculty published 25 research papers in UGC journals in total. We carry out a sizable number of extension initiatives each year because we are doing a good job of upholding our social duty.

Our NSS unit and Legal cell of our college are at the forefront of these extension activities which include Blood

Donation, Tree Plantation, Community Labour, Health Awareness, Digital Literacy, Water Conservation, Campaign Against Plastic Waste, Cleanliness Campaigns, Voters' Awareness Campaigns, Women's Empowerment through Legal Aid and Self-Employment as well as the Empowerment of Villages through Annual Community Labour Camps of the N.S.S. Together, these initiatives help to create a bond between the local community and the institution.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

There are 15 regular classrooms, equipped with comfortable desks, benches, dais and black/Green/ Whiteboards. Out of these 06 classes are equipped with projects and smart boards. In all, 04 rooms are equipped with projector facilities. Our Library is well-stocked with 14535 books and memberships of N-LIST (for e-books and e-journals), Law finder, manupatra. In addition to the journals available through N-LIST, we have independently subscribed many scholarly journals and periodicals. The Library is computerized with SOUL software. There is a facility of Web OPAC and barcode based issue - return of books. There are quite a few rare books of various subjects available in the library.

We keep updating and improving our infrastructure, equipment, and IT facilities. We presently have more than 194 desktop computers, 02 laptops with an internet connection of 5 Mbps. The office is fully computerized with software for administrative and accounting purposes. There are sufficient printers, scanners, projectors along with photocopiers. We also have state-of-the art sporting facilities which include a 200m running track, gymnastics hall and facilities for four outdoor games. There are ramps, walker, and a wheel chair for the differently abled. There is a spacious common room for Girls and washrooms for students and staff.

Student Support and Progression

In Student Support and Progression, the institute is making a lot of efforts to ease and enhance the progression of the students to higher education and employment. Being a Law college, most of our students join the courts as an advocate/ judges after completing their degree course. The Career and Counseling Cell, tries to ensure that most of students showed qualify the judicial competitive exams. We also make sure that the students be benefitted from the various scholarship schemes of the government. More than 62 percent of our students get benefitted from various scholarship and free-ship schemes of the government and the college. In the last five years, total 5of our students have passed exams line NET/SLET and 14 students have cracked judiciary exam. There is an anti-ragging cell as well as a Cell for the Prevention of Sexual Harassment of Women established as per the UGC norms. We strictly make sure that incidents of ragging do not happen in the college. As per norms, is a Students Council which works as a platform for the students to undertake various curricular and extra-curricular activities and also serves to solve different issues of the students. The college has an Alumni Association which is duly registered with an executive committee consisting of the alumni representatives.

There is a college level committee to look after the alumni-related matters. We regularly conduct alumni meets. Our alumni contribute academically though not much financially.

Governance, Leadership and Management

We believe in practicing decentralization in the management of the institution. Our college GNLC Indore works

with a constant awareness of its vision to empower the youth of the region with the best of legal knowledge and Career- Oriented Skills and Research Orientation. The GNLC Indore is affiliated to D.A.V.V Indore and is recognized the Bar Council of India. Teachers, non-teaching staff, and student's representative get a representation on the College Development Committee. IQAC is an integral part of the college administration. It works to promote quality culture in the institution. IQAC constantly organizes various events and comes up with various innovative suggestions to promote quality culture among the students, faculty, and the staff. As a part of its routine practice, the IQAC keeps organizing various trainings and workshops of short and long duration for the faculty members, non-teaching staff, and the students. The Institution has a well-established mechanism to address the grievances received from all stakeholders. Programs for faculty empowerment are organized; leave granted for attending Faculty Development Programs. The college follows the "Performance Based Appraisal System" of UGC as prescribed in its regulations. The accounts are audited regularly.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

GNLC Indore has strong practice of adopting Institutional values and best practices among its students and faculty members. It provides safety, security, and facilities to ensure comfortable working environment for all the employees and the students. The motto of the Institute is "Legal education for social Justice" which reflects through providing professional legal education and training to all irrespective of caste, creed, religion, province, faith, gender, political affiliation, and financial status. To inculcate good practices in developing professional competencies to encourage research and take measures to address social and environmental concerns.

The College has formed various committees to monitor the day to day activities and to accomplish the mission and values of the institute. The committees regularly meet and suggest suitable initiatives with actions to be taken. The Institutional values like integrity, respect, responsibility, and excellence are monitored by these committees.

The curriculum developed by the university also considers the professional ethics, universal human values, constitution of India and environmental studies. These values are deliberated, practiced, and implemented through regular teaching learning process. GNLC Indore celebrates national festivals and international days of prime importance. Every year, World Water day, World environmental day, Teachers day, women's day, Law day are celebrated. Awareness programs such as Digital India, Make in India, Swatch Bharath etc. are also conducted. As a part of social responsibility, blood donation camps, creating legal awareness in society, road safety measures, constitutional rights, consciousness on voting rights among youths etc were conducted. Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:	Govt. New Law College, Indore (GNLC) has always strived for a multidisciplinary approach in its academic as well as co-curricular activities. Students are encouraged to undergo minor/major projects in the Multidisciplinary/ Interdisciplinary mode by formulating teams from different courses. Students are also encouraged to formulate teams from different disciplines to participate in various events like moot courts etc. Currently, GNLC is in process of revision of its curriculum for students admitted in session 2021-22 and onwards, in which provision will be made to offer various certificate courses in the fields other than the parent discipline.
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2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	We have applied for our students to take online courses through online mode through National Schemes like SWAYAM, NPTEL etc, and is considering for credits earned against elective courses. Revision of curriculum has been done in the year 2021. These revisions are applicable for students admitted in session 2022-23 and onwards. We are in the process of developing a system for executing ABC in true spirit.
3. Skill development:	Govt. New Law College Indore, GNLC is imparting training to the budding lawyers on new techniques of legal awareness. Students are interested in learning the latest techniques of legal drafting, legal language etc. GNLC offers certificate courses that are skill oriented. Students are being trained in the field of Legal, Managements courses. Students of GNLC are presently being given hands-on exposure to practical subjects through courts and Jail Visits in which students get the first hand experience of experiential learning.
4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	Indian Knowledge system will include knowledge from ancient India to modern India and clear sense of India's future aspiration with regard to education, health and environment. GNLC is in process of starting certificate course for students admitted in session 2022-23 and onwards, in which subjects related to Indian knowledge systems will find a due place as elective subjects.
5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	College was accredited by NAAC in the year 2017 and opts grade B+ is implementing OBE for all programs specially in law courses. We have well defined Program Outcomes (PO), Program Educational outcomes (PEO) and Course Outcomes (CO) on our website and prominent places in the departments. Students are assessed as per OBE attainment model.
6. Distance education/online education:	The affiliating university DAVV University, Indore has selected GNLC as its learning centre for offering various courses in offering UG/PG/Ph.D program. Law is a Practical and professional course science it's not possible to provide distance and online learning. GNLC has successfully imparted all its courses content delivery in online mode during the Pandemic (COVID-19) and also conducted online examinations successfully by using our own team

The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organizes special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners. The college admits students from various socio-economic backgrounds. The college conducts every possible measure to assess the learning levels of its students. The students are counselled, guided and oriented at the time of admission to make them aware about the course, mode of internal assessment, external assessment, curricular and co-curricular activities, rules and regulations of the institution as well as facilities available in the college. The list of courses, curricular and co-curricular activities, rules and regulations, facilities available etc are also published in the college prospectus which is provided to the students before the beginning of academic sessions. At the beginning of each course teachers assess the learning levels of the students in the class, their knowledge about the course and accordingly special programmes for advanced learners and slow learners are planned. Remedial and extra classes are conducted for advanced and slow learners. After the completion of syllabus, subject classes are also repeated for slow learners and late admissions. Teachers remain available in college to clear the doubts and counsel the students even on a one to one basis. Advanced learners are encouraged to become class mentors.

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning peer learning, team teaching, case law method and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences. Govt. New Law College Indore always encourage student-centric learning through various methods such as moot court, youth parliament, debates, and group discussions, quiz competitions, assignments and presentations in participative learning and problem solving methodologies. Regular participative activities like, group discussions, assignments, field visits, educational tours, seminars, expert lectures are conducted in the college and the students actively participate in these activities within and outside the institution. Students are given individual class assignments for focusing on self study and to encourage independent learning. Different student support systems are available in the college like Library, Computer Lab, Reading Room, ICT based classrooms (Smart Classrooms). Students are trained for Basic Life skills such as Self Defence, Swachh Bharat Summer Internships, and Personal Hygiene and Sanitation. Beyond the classroom, college gives high importance to all-round development of students through extra-curricular, co curricular and field based

activities. The objective of student centric activities outside the classroom is to involve students as much as possible in learning procedures that require more than reading or viewing the material. Students are taken for study tours to the sites of interest in order to get familiar with the field/ social conditions. These activities play an integral role in allowing a switch over from absorption of information while learning during academic sessions and creating a safe space to relax, interact, collaborate, think out of the box, and nurture their talents and leadership capabilities. To increase the concentration in various activities, the college has established various committees and clubs including the Cultural Committee, Sports Committee, Moot Court Committee, Legal Aid Committee, Career counselling cell, the Debate Committee and NSS club. Both intra and inter-college sports competitions are organized, where students exhibit talent in variety of games, to foster spirit of togetherness and leadership. In order to develop human values, ethics and social responsibility, students are encouraged to participate in these activities.
